BUK Expels 17 Students, Exonerates 3 for Irregularities in Entry Qualifications

ayero University Senate at its 355th Meeting held on Wednesday 16th August, 2017 has approved the expulsion of 17 students due to irregularities discovered in their entry qualifications. It has also exonerated three others for failure to establish any case of irregularities against them.

This was contained in a statement jointly signed by the Chairman and Secretary, Senate Committee on Entry Qualifications, Professor Bala Sidi Aliyu and Hajiya Amina Umar Abdullahi. The punitive measures were taken in accordance with category 3.6 of the General Examinations and Academic Regulations (GEAR) and after following due process.

The management he said had continued to sponsor and support staff to attend conferences and workshops and to go for higher

The Vice Chancellor said a committee was set to look into the possibility of creating a way that physically challenged persons could equally benefit from the University Main Library, which has a section on the ground floor dedicated to their needs. He said the committee would also advise Management on how to build toilets for the physically challenged persons.

Professor Bello thanked members of the congregation and all other staff and students of the University for the kind of cooperation and understanding given to his administration. "I personally appreciate the team spirit between Management, on the one hand, and all unions, on the other, as well as among members of the various

unions. I applaud this understanding and commitment to our common goal. Together, we are working to build a system that, we hope, will serve as a model for the Nigerian University System." The Vice Chancellor concluded.

In his speech earlier, the Chairman of the Standing Committee on Congregation (SCC) Dr Muhammad Babangida Muhammad, of the Islamic Studies Department said the meeting was the second in the year, as part of the resolutions made by the congregation in its 49th meeting that would be held twice in a year. He said the meeting was very important considering the fact that it was an avenue where members meet with management and discuss the way forward in terms of University administration.

The speaker defined hepatitis "as any inflammatory process causing hepato cellular injury, which can be acute or chronic; and that Hepatitis A, B and C are the

he threat of viral hepatitis was a global one that most common causes of Viral Hepatitis worldwide." He emphasized the need to sensitize people on the dangers of the disease, which could be in the body for up to 10 – 15 years before it manifested itself and by then it would have caused damage in the liver, showing the end stage or terminal symptom as the case may.

> He said the viruses could be detected earlier in children or the new-born, who mostly contract it from their mother or through other children they come in contact with. It can also be contracted through contaminated blood or sexual intercourse between couples and that the only way to prevent the spread was through immunization of children and early testing to know one's

> He advised medical personnel to be diligent in their

work and ensure the use of standardized laboratory equipment to prevent wrong diagnosis.

The Chief Medical Director of AKTH, Prof. Aminu Z. The event which took place on Saturday, August 12, 2017 with the theme: youth Building peace was organized by the impact Nigeria Project, American Corner, Kano and service Delivery CDS Group of the National Youth Service Corps (NYSC) with the support of Bayero University, Kano.

The keynote address at the occasion was delivered by Prof Habu Mohammed of Political Science Department, who presented a paper titled: The youth and peace building in Nigeria: Expectations versus REALITY. He enjoined youth to strive to participate actively in peace building activities because, globally, the youth not only constituted almost half of the world's population, but they also took the large share of the consequences of violence.

According to the speaker, there was no better time the theme of the International Youth Day matched to the country's aspiration for peace, unity and national integration than in these days of agitation for separation by some groups and the renewed activities of insurgents in the Northeast.

Therefore, the Professor of political science challenged the youth, who he described "as fomenters, triggers and perpetrators of conflict and at the same time the cheap victims of of violence," to develop interest in the culture of civic engagement in the area of peace building through campaigns and the organization of peace clubs on university campuses and other higher institutions of learning as well as secondary schools, among other strategies.

He concluded by arguing that for the youth to make a meaningful impact on peace they had to shun social vices such as cybercrimes by the so-called yahoo-yahoo boys and distanced themselves from youth and adolescent gangs that often served as foot soldiers of "money bag", which he described as political
