# Over 12,000 Candidates Conduct BUK Aptitude Test

total of 12,209 candidates sat for the 2019 Bayero University, Kano, Aptitude Test (BUKAT).

This was disclosed by the Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Academics), Professor Adamu Idris Tanko, shortly after the screening exercise on Saturday, 17th August, 2019.

The Deputy Vice-Chancellor said 15,817 candidates applied to BUK for the 2019/2020 admission session. According to him, about 12, 209 participated in the screening exercise. This invariably means that some candidates missed the exercise.

The screening was conducted in morning and afternoon sessions, with a view to ensuring a smooth conduct of the exercise.

Professor Tanko, moreover, expressed satisfaction over the peaceful conduct of the exercise.

He said that the screening was very smooth while the staff assigned to oversee the program were very dutiful, adding that the exercise started on schedule and all the candidates were law-abiding. "The screening was hitch free. No examination misconduct was reported whatsoever", he disclosed.

Also speaking at the event, the Registrar, Hajiya Fatima Binta Mohammed, expressed delight over the arrangements and smooth conduct of the exercise. She stated that more venues were provided to decongest the crowd and two situation rooms established, one each at Old and New Campuses to decentralize the coordination of the exercise.

Hajiya Binta Mohammed pointed out that the University had engaged the services of both teaching and nonteaching staff as invigilators and some students served as 'campus guides' in order to ensure the smooth running of the programme.

Also commenting on the screening, the Director, Centre for Information Technology (CIT), Professor Mohammed Ajiya, said that the exercise could be rated as very successful, as it was stress-free.

He said that candidates were accommodated on the basis of their courses.

Professor Ajiya said that each candidate was given questions based on his/her registered JAMB courses and the questions were personalized and randomized to avoid any examination misconduct.

Similarly, the Director, Directorate of Examinations, Admissions and Records (DEAR), Hajiya Amina Umar Abdullahi, who coordinated the screening, disclosed that majority of the candidates were well behaved and properly dressed, noting that no cases of impersonation were recorded.

Two candidates who wrote the screening examination, Ummuhani Abdulmalik Ize (B.Sc. Biochemistry) and Abubakar Ayuba Abu Sufyan (B.Sc. Architecture), expressed satisfaction with the arrangement made by the University

# Fidelity Bank Empowers 360 BUK Students

A total of about 360 undergraduate students of Bayero University, Kano were given skills acquisition training on various trades and entrepreneurship in a special project sponsored by Fidelity Bank, as part of its corporate responsibility programme.

Speaking at the graduation ceremony, on Saturday, 24<sup>th</sup> August, 2019 at the Students Affairs Hall, the Deputy Managing Director of Fidelity Bank, Alhaji Muhammad Balarabe, disclosed that the beneficiaries were drawn from departments by a random selection irrespective of their geographical, ethnic or religious inclinations.

He revealed that the Bank had spent well over N5 million on the program, which included training in tailoring, knitting, computer, cloth embellishment, cocktail, wig making, designing, make-over and shoe making, among others.

Alhaji Balarabe said the desire was to acquaint the students with entrepreneurship skills, so that they could be self-reliant upon graduation and, therefore, become business oriented as against the norms of waiting for white collar jobs.

He said in addition to giving them the skill acquision training, the bank had equally provided start-off kits to about 200 trainees with a view to starting their business in earnest, pointing out that the programme, which was in collaboration with Gazelle Academy Vocational Centre, would be a continuous one.

Speaking during the ceremony, the Vice Chancellor of Bayero University, Professor Muhammad Yahuza

Bello, who was represented by the Director of Public Affairs, Malam Ahmad Shehu, commended the bank for the gesture and urged other corporate organizations to emulate it.

He charged the beneficiaries to make proper utilization of the skills they acquired, which he said were aimed at empowering them to be self-reliant, so that they could be successful entrepreneurs.

The Dean of the Students Affairs Division, Dr. Shamsuddeen Umar, in his remarks advised the young students to imbibe the culture of being self-reliant, saying that entrepreneurship was more rewarding than waiting for government jobs, which nowadays were not forth-coming.

Many of the beneficiaries expressed their gratitude to the bank for the opportunity to widen their horizons to venture into entrepreneurship and promised to put into practical use the skills they acquired for national growth and development.

The visiting delegation were at the University to assess the curricula and courses provided by the Faculty of Pharmaceutical Sciences that would facilitate the registration of Pharmacy graduates to register with the Pharmacists Council of Nigeria (PCN) for practice upon graduation.

The leader of the team, Professor Kolawole, disclosed

that the aim of the accreditation visit was not to witchhunt or sabotage the programme but rather to assess and improve on the existing facilities to ensure that the programme met international standards.

Professor Kolawole, who described his team as a composition professionals from academia and Federal Ministry of Health, specially thanked the Management of the University for the support it give them during their previous visit.

In attendance during the visit were the Registrar, Hajiya Fatima Binta Mohammed, the Director, Academic Planning Unit, Professor Bala Sidi, and the Dean, Faculty of Pharmaceutical Sciences, Bayero University, Kano.

The Vice Chancellor was happy with the composition of the team, who were men of honour and respect. He also

described the visitation as timely because it would allow the University to take any corrective measure (if any) before a visit by the NUC in October this year.

'Let us know where we can do better especially on the Pharm programme and we will be happy to take corrective measures', he disclosed.

### NCRRD Organizes 1<sup>st</sup> National Conference, Seeks Collaboration with Stakeholders to Promote Reading in Nigeria By Adamu Garba

The Director, Nigeria Centre for Reading Research and Development (NCRRD), Bayero University, Kano Professor Isma'ila A. Tsiga, expressed concern over the growing decline in reading culture among youth to the point that he showed readiness to partner with interested bodies in the centres' quest to promote reading in Nigeria.

Professor Tsiga made this remarks during the opening ceremony of the maiden National Conference jointly organized by the NCRRD in conjunction with United

State Agency for International Development (USAID) and Northern Educational Initiative (NEI+).

The conference, held at Dangote Business School, Bayero University, Kano, between 19<sup>th</sup> and 23rd August, 2019, was tagged: Children's Books and Teaching Early Grade Reading in Nigeria.

NCRRD was established in 2017 as a collaborative project between the Bayero University, Kano and the Florida State University, Tallahassee with a support from the USAID to promote the teaching of reading in the country and conduct research in related matters.

According to Professor Tsiga, the conference was organized to adopt immediate measures in checking the general decline in the reading culture in the society, especially among youth.

He criticized the failure of many parents to inculcate the correct reading habit in their children. "Many of the teachers, here in Nigeria", he frowned "are not themselves adequately prepared to teach reading to the

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children, who come to start their formal education in the schools".

According to him, this declarative situation was made worse by the availability of cheap tools of modern communication that encouraged dependency, while at the same time distracted young learners from sustained reading efforts.

He added that another major failure was lack of sufficient and appropriate age-grade learning materials, especially appropriate published texts, that would motivate children to learn quickly and with pleasure in both English and indigenous languages.

While declaring the conference open, the Vice Chancellor, Professor Muhammad Yahuza Bello. described reading as the fundamental foundation of

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education.

He said that "no nation could achieve meaningful development without embracing the collective habit of constant reference to books and other sources of knowledge through continuous reading by its citizens".

Professor Bello commended Florida State University for its support and particularly Professor Jeffery Milligan, the Director of the Learning Systems Institute, for the collaboration to establish the reading centre in Bayero University, Kano.

In her keynote paper, Dr. Nicole Patton Terry from the Florida Centre for Reading and Research, Florida State University, titled: "Addressing Reading Through Research and Partnership" revealed that oral language mattered for reading and variations within the African American population.

Dr. Terry observed that educational challenges in schools arose from challenges inside and outside of schools. According to her, the solutions were likely to be found both inside and outside the schools.

The conference was attended by numerous educationists and professionals across different sectors of education, including Dr. Denise O'Toole, Director, Office of Education, USAID, Abuja; Dr. Jarret Terry, the representative of the President, Florida State University; Dr. Hamid Bobboyi, Executive Secretary, UBEC, Abuja and Professor Ismail Junaidu, Executive Secretary, NERDC, Abuja, among many others.

### Hausa Culture May Bring Peace in the World- Prof Bunza

A renowned scholar from Federal University Gusau, Professor Aliyu Muhammad Bunza, predicted that if the whole world adopted Hausa Culture in their day to day activities, peace would reign in the world.

Professor Bunza made the prediction when presenting a paper, titled *Hausa Da Hausawa A Duniyar Karni Na Ashirin Da Daya* during a lecture organized by <u>Kungiyar</u> <u>Hausa</u>, Bayero University, Kano, on Monday, 26<sup>th</sup> August 2019, to mark this year's International Hausa Day.

He said going by history, the Hausa people had many measures employed to ensure that they lived in peace with one another. "If you trace the history of jokes among Kano and Zazzau people, Katsina and Hadejia people, butchers and the Ulama, you find out that the two communities, in each case, had at one time, fought with one another before they changed to cracking jokes," Prof Bunza added. He further stated that if the same measure was followed, the world would be in peace.

On the development of Hausa Studies in Nigerian Universities, Professor Bunza said today there were over one hundred Professors and over ten thousand students studying Hausa at different levels. He said no language in Nigeria had attained such a stage.

Speaking on the Hausa International Day set up by the United Nations, Profession Bunza said this didn't come as a surprise, considering the status that Hausa had reached worldwide. He added, "Today, over four hundred radio stations are broadcasting in Hausa and almost two hundred newspapers print in Hausa".

He called on the Hausa people to work hard in promoting and protecting the language and culture in the world.

A House of Representatives Member representing Fagge Federal Constituency, Honourable Aminu Suleman Goro, who is also the Chairman of the House Committee on Education, promised to do anything humanly possible to contribute in promoting indigenous languages.

In his speech, the Director, Centre for Research in Nigerian Languages, Translation and Folkore Bayero University, Kano Professor Aliyu Muazu, said the Centre, in its effort to ensure that the Hausa Language was used in teaching in the primary and secondary schools in Northern Nigeria, science textbooks were published in Hausa by the Centre.

### Scholars, Communication Experts Give Recipe for Investigative Journalism to Thrive in Nigeria

For investigative journalism to thrive in Nigeria, there is a need for journalists to be well trained, better equipped and have a sound knowledge of political, economic and social issues and the students of journalism must embrace the challenge that the field offers in order to hold the government accountable.

Some of the resolutions reached at an interactive



workshop on Broadcasting and Investigative Journalism organized by the Faculty of Communication, Bayero University, Kano on Thursday, 22<sup>nd</sup> August, 2019.

The interactive session brought together communication scholars, professional broadcasters, seasoned journalists and students of journalism to discuss ways of how to improve the investigative reporting in Nigeria.

"Journalists must be alert when embarking on investigative reporting and must be conscious of the seven layers of safety: Psychological, physical, economic, gender, digital, social and perhaps political safeties," said the convener of the workshop and Dean, School of Postgraduate Studies, Professor Umaru Pate.

The lead speaker and Chairman of Channels Media Group, John Momoh, who was represented by the Assistant General Manager Operations of Channels Television, Kingsley Uranta, said journalists had a herculean task of digging deep and finding viable facts for public interests. Mr Momoh said students should be aware that they were going to serve humanity and that the journalism job was a thankless one. He said that since they were contributing to humanity, they should do the right thing.

On his part, a veteran broadcaster and convener of popular NTA programme, Tuesday Live, Mr Cyril Stober, argued that media houses should embark on investigative reporting for public interest and critically define aspects that constituted public interest in order to avoid reporting issues of legal concern.

Professor Ralph Akinfeleye, while reading the resolutions, said the interactive session resolved that investigative journalism required research with constant variables and concomitant variables. He said journalists needed adequate training before embarking on investigative reporting and that resources must be involved to ensure effective reporting.

Earlier, in his remarks, the Vice Chancellor, Professor Muhammad Yahuza Bello, urged journalists to ensure that reporting was based on facts and investigation rather than hearsay. He urged them to be critical of what they saw, heard and read.

Prof Bello said he was highly satisfied and happy with the calibre of the seasoned professionals and communication scholars gathered at the interactive session.
