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World Bank, AAU Satisfied with ACEPHAP Implementation Initiative

orld Bank and Association of African Universities (AAU) officials have expressed satisfaction with the level of preparedness of ACEPHAP in its implementation of initiatives and urged the Centre to take a cue from the success story of Centre for Dryland Agriculture.

The duo of Professor Nodumo Dhlamini, the Director-ICT Services of AAU and Michelle Niescicresko of the World Bank, who spoke separately during an ACE Impact Implementation Plan meeting at ACEPHAP, on Wednesday, 20th November, 2019, said 'they were convinced that from what they saw on ground. Africa Centre of Excellence for Population Health and Policy (ACEPHAP), Bayero University, Kano was capable of following the impressive footsteps of the Centre for Dryland Agriculture in the implementation of the World Bank ACE projects.

Professor Nodumo Dhlamini, who spoke first during a courtesy call on the Vice Chancellor, Professor Muhammad Yahuza Bello, shortly before the commencement of the meeting, said they were in BUK to hold discussion with ACEPHAP team members on the implementation plans of the centre and see if their initiative was in tandem with existing ACE standards.

'We are here to ensure that the right things are done. We are not here to police the Centre. We are here to assist ACEPHAP in the implementation of the ACE projects in line with World Bank accepted standards. Our mandate in AAU is to improve the quality of education,' she remarked.

AAU Director of ICT Services congratulated Bayero University for being one of the few universities that had two centres of excellence, implementing World Bank ACE Projects, adding that the choice of ACEPHAP was an indication that CDA was not only doing well, but has also excelled in the implementation strategy.

Professor Nodumo stated that AAU and World Bank had a good working relationship with Bayero University, assuring that they would continue to strengthen such relationships in the interest of humanity.

Responding, the Vice Chancellor, Professor Bello expressed gratitude to the AAU and the World Bank for believing in the institution's two Centres, ACEPHAP and CDA, assuring that the University would do everything humanly possible to support the centres to succeed in the ACE Impact Implementation plans of the projects.

He said ACE was making a difference across Africa, saying that the University would surely use the experience of CDA to put ACEPHAP on sound footing to ensure the success of the ACE project.

Professor Bello said their visit was timely, urging them to let the University know areas of ACEPHAP's deficiency and needs in the ACE implementation plans, so that they could make the necessary amends.

In her presentation, Michelle Niescicresko from the World Bank spoke extensively on what the centre needed to do to achieve results. She drew the attention of the ACEPHAP team that the World Bank money was not a grant but a loan and that unless there were good results in terms of project execution further funds would not be accessed. She also revealed that unspent funds would be returned back to government coffers.

The World Bank expert took time to explain in detail how proper budgeting in line with the loan's standard was prepared and executed. She also explained the ACE requirement in terms of admission policy for ACE postgraduate training programmes. She stated that 30 per cent were reserved for female candidates both regional and national 'as anything short of that will not be accepted by the World Bank and AAU.'

She described ACEPHAP as a lucky child who would definitely learn from the mistakes, successes and experiences of CDA to record great achievements. She hoped that all the observations made would be taken into consideration during the implementation phase of the project.

Also in her address, Professor Nodumo Dhlamini of AAU spoke of the need for the Centre to have a robust, effective and functional website, a dedicated officer manning the centre's ICT. Through this, she added the Centre could be visible globally.

Earlier, the centre made three presentations. Firstly, a brief on the mission, vision and objectives of the centre by Deputy Director, Outreach, Dr Salisu Maiwada Abubakar. Secondly, details' regarding the activities of the centre so far, by the Deputy Director, Research, Dr. Taiwo Amole Thirdly, was the Centre's implementation plan, by the Centre's director, Professor Hadiza Galadanci.

Those who attended the meeting are: Michelle Niescicresko and Janis P. Tuptsis from the World Bank, Professor Nodumo Dhlamini from AAU and Mr. Obi Ukwuagu and Mrs. Lulu Udoka from NUC. From the ACEPHAP team, Professor Hadiza Galadanci, Director of the Centre, two Deputy Directors, Dr. Taiwo Amole and Dr. Salisu Maiwada Abubakar as well as the Centre's Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) officer, Dr. Baba Maiyaki.

Others were, the Finance Officer, Mr. Usman Gomina, the Auditor, Abubakar Adamu Rano, Rabiu Husseini Sagagi, Procurement Officer, Bala G. Abdullahi, Communication Officer and representatives from the 8 collaborating Departments of the University as well as the Centre's administrative Secretary, Ali Yakasai and his assistant, Malam Tijjani Mohammed Musa.

Physicians Across Continents, BUK to Establish Heart Centre

The Saudi-based Non-Governmental Organization, the Physicians Across Continents (PAC) through the King Salman Health Foundation is to collaborate with Bayero University, Kano and Aminu Kano Teaching Hospital towards establishment of a Centre for Heart Diseases in Kano.

President of Physicians Across Continents (PAC), Dr. Sa'ad Qarni stated this during a courtesy visit to the Vice Chancellor, Professor Muhammad Yahuza Bello on Friday, 22nd November, 2019 at Council Chamber.

Dr. Qarni who led the delegation has solicited the support of Bayero University to jointly establish the Centre. He described the rising heart diseases in Nigeria as worrisome that drew attention of PAC to establish a well-equipped Heart Centre in Kano that would cater for the teeming population of the country.

He said PAC was a Saudi-based nongovernmental organization established in

2003 and operating in over 40 countries. It came to Nigeria in 2016.

Dr. Saad enjoined BUK to ensure a transparent and conducive environment that would enable it to function. He added that the Centre, through the collaboration, would advance African physicians especially in the areas of training and research.

The Vice Chancellor, Professor Muhammad Yahuza Bello, while responding, assured the support of the University in whatever aspect that PAC may require. He said, in terms of transparency, the University has been receiving many international grants including those from the MacArthur Foundation and the World



Bank grants for the Centre for Dryland Agriculture (CDA) and Africa Centre for Excellence in Population Health and Policy (ACEPHAP) and the University had been utilizing the grants judiciously.

Professor Yahuza described the objectives of PAC as noble and glaring. He reiterated that the University would ensure that PAC succeeds not only in Nigeria but across the world.

The Directorate of Research, Innovation and Partnership (DRIP), has conducted a one-day training workshop on Research Ethics and Integrity for members of the board of the directorate.

DRIP was established to principally coordinate and manage all aspects of research in the University, among others. The workshop, which was the first of its kind, took place on Wedneday, 20th November, 2019 at the Centre for Gender Studies.

While declaring the workshop open, the Vice Chancellor, Prof. Muhammad Yahuza Bello represented by the Director of Public Affairs, Malam Ahmad Shehu reiterated the University

management's commitment to supporting high impact research.

He said researches are very vital in the growth and development of any society, and this could only be possible when members of the academia engage in the conduct of ethical and credible high impact researches for the overall interest of the society.

Papers were presented at the workshop highlighted the nexus between societal growth and development with a credible research, as speakers came to the apt conclusion that it was through research that the society would be able to identify its problem and find solution on to them.

The first presenter, Dr. A. M. Abdussamad, in his paper titled "Concept and Principles of Research Ethics" explained the importance of research ethics as it provides checks and balances for the researcher, protects the

checks and balances for the researcher, protects the research participants, sets standards and is a major requirement for practitioners in most fields.

Also in his presentation, Prof. Muhammad Musa Borodo, highlight the significance of Research Ethics Review Committees. He also advised that for a research to be credible, right from the writing of the proposals, it must follow prescribed protocols to ensure the research has ethical and



scientific validity.

A paper titled "Ethical Issues in Academic Research" presented by Prof. by Usman Shu'aib, was about the issue of plagiarism and intellectual dishonesty, lack of humility, violation of copyrights, phrases depicting lack of knowledge and responsibility.

In her vote of thanks, the Deputy Director, Innovation and Technology Transfer, Dr. Hassana Sani Darma thanked the presenters and participants and prayed that what had been learnt would be put into practice for the development of the University.

The **common cold** is an upper respiratory tract infection **caused** by many different viruses. The **common cold** is transmitted by virus-infected airborne droplets or by direct contact with infected secretions. Being in **cold** weather does not **cause the common cold**, but **cold** weather promotes close contact, making it easier for the viruses to spread and infect more people. Cold weather may also reduce the immune response and make it harder for the body to fight off germs.

Cold symptoms come on gradually and can include:

- · a blocked or runny nose
- · a sore throat
- headaches
- muscle aches
- coughs
- sneezing
- · a raised temperature
- pressure in your ears and face
- · loss of taste and smell

The symptoms are the same in adults and children.

Sometimes, symptoms last longer in children.

Prevention

Some precautions that can help avoid catching the common cold include:

- Avoid close contact with someone infected with a cold
- Eat plenty of vitamin-rich fruit and vegetables to help keep the immune system strong.
- When sneezing or coughing, make sure it is done into a tissue. Discard the tissue carefully and wash your hands.
- If you sneeze into your hands, make sure you wash them with soap and water immediately.
- If you have no tissues or a handkerchief, cough into the inside (crook) of your elbow rather than into your hands.
- Wash your hands regularly; cold viruses can be transmitted from one person to another by touch.
 In fact, more germs are passed by shaking hands than by kissing.
- Keep surfaces in your home clean especially in the kitchen or bathroom.
- · Avoid touching your face, especially your nose and mouth.
