### Holds Stakeholders' Interactiv p on Reintegrating Migrants, Vulnerable Youths By Nura Garba

Stakeholders from various organizations met in Bayero University, Kano on Tuesday, 8th November, 2022 for engagement meeting to implement the Community Based Reintegration Project of migrants in Kano. The project implementation agreement was signed between Bayero University, Kano and International Organization for Migration (IOM).

The project aims to establish a community-based reintegration (CBR) projects based on IOM guidelines. It will contribute to sustainable reintegration of returnees and create livelihood opportunities for unemployed youths and returnees in Kano.

According to the project's Principal Investigator, Professor Muhammad Auwal Hussain, the approach of the project involves returning and potential migrants in income generating activities with their home communities to promote inclusive local development while also reducing the socio-economic vulnerabilities and the impact of returned migration.

He stated that IOM focused on community based for ownership, sustainability and impacts rather than individuals as there was evidence that showed that focusing on individuals, especially during this political era, usually ended up in squandering the funds and nontargeted individuals benefitted more.

According to him, most of the activities of integrating returnees were concentrated in southern Nigeria like Edo, Delta, Lagos, but recent findings showed that there was high concentration of human trafficking in northern Nigeria, especially in Kano State.

Professor Hussain, who is the Dean Faculty of Agriculture, explained that the identification and profiling of project beneficiaries would ensure transparency on the selection criteria taking into cognizance 60% returning migrants and 40% youths that were at risk of being vulnerable in communities.

"The project will target communities with high rates of irregular migration and Dala, Fagge, Gwale and Kumbotso Local Governments being identified with the lion's share of returned migrants," he said.

The beneficiaries will be trained on life skill training such as emotional skills, stress management, creative thinking decision making and problem solving. They will also be trained on social skills such as self-presentation,



negotiation, communication skills and sports, among others.

Professor Hussain added that the selected beneficiaries would be empowered with various agricultural enterprises with the aim of improving their psycho-social activities and means of livelihood.

The stakeholders were drawn from NAPTIP, Ministry for Sports and Development, NDLEA, National Directorate of Employment (NDE), Kano State Emergency Management, Ministry for Local Government, National Immigration Office, among others. They provided credible and incisive inputs on how best to implement the project agreement.

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# World Bank Supervisory Team Rates ACEPHAP High



frica Centre of Excellence for Population Health and Policy (ACEPHAP) receives a major boost penultimate weekend when a team from the World Bank on a two-day supervision mission described the centre as one of the best performing centres in the country. The team visited ACEPHAP on Saturday, 29<sup>th</sup> and Sunday, 30<sup>th</sup> October, 2022.

The Leader of the team, Dr. Janis P. Tupesis, said what he saw on the ground coupled with his interaction with the centre's management team, faculty staff and the regional students, he was convinced that 'ACEPHAP is not only on track, but also among the highly rated and best performing centres,' he remarked.

He said the interaction the team had with ACEPHAP stakeholders made him to conclude that the Centre is having remarkably committed staff, committed students and, above all, committed management team at the University level, which he said was why the centre was able to attract a lot of international collaborations and regional students.

Dr. Jupesis stated that he was not surprised by the University's recent rise in the ranking of Nigerian universities, saying that such tremendous breakthrough was the result of committed scholarship by BUK academics and the good research, national and international collaborative work of the two centres of excellence in the University, ACEPHAP and CDA.

He also supported the initiative of ACEPHAP to migrate to digital learning (virtual teaching) where national and regional students would receive lectures online as deliberate efforts to address the menace of incessant strikes and other distractive tendencies.

The World Bank Team leader explained that the visit was a routine one aimed at assessing the activities of ACE centres. He said it was a partnership and result-base visit with a view to listening to centre staff, gather information, and see how far projects were being executed in order to help the centre succeed in its mandate.

He said if no extension was granted, the ACE project would be coming to an end in 2024, saying that the conclusion of all ACE ongoing projects within the terminal date of the project was paramount to the World Bank.

Dr. Jupesis thanked the ACEPHAP Team, faculty staff and regional students and assured that his report to the World Bank would reflect all the positive realities he observed. He hoped the staff of the centre would maintain the tempo of their performance.

Earlier, the Director of the Centre, Professor Hadiza Galadanci, who made a powerpoint presentation of the activities of the centre spoke extensively on what the centre did in the areas of research, collaboration, short capacity building training carried out within and outside the country, workshops, conferences attendance and provision of infrastructure and other equipment to collaborative departments.

One of the major challenges the centre faced which were re-emphasized by collaborative departmental staff during their presentations included the eight months strike embarked upon by the Academic Staff Union of Universities (ASUU), saying that it impacted on its regional students seriously. She explained that it was in order to address the menace of break in academic activities that the Centre planned to introduce virtual teaching.

Professor Galadanci also spoke on the need for the extension of the lifespan of the project beyond 2024. She argued that after the Centre won the World Bank grant in 2019, funds were not released for the commencement of the ACE project implementation until in November 2021. And that even then, the centre could only access the fund until January 2022. She said it was the University's Vice Chancellor who assisted the centre with loans and other advances which she said made the centre to immediately commence the project implementation without waiting for release of funds from the World Bank.

Speaking on what the centre was doing to sustain the project after the expiration of the project lifespan, Professor Galadanci explained that efforts were being made to ensure that fees charged for students would go directly to ACEPHAP and not the University. The centre would also charge fees for its short courses instead of

running them free. She also said the centre would continue to sustain the project after the conclusion of the ACE to source for grants; it also intended to produce products project. out of its research work for sale to generate revenue. She said the centre's conference hall would continue to be leased out for holding conferences and workshops to prospective seekers for fees, and that the centre would also do consultancy services all in an effort to generate revenue University (AAU).

assessment of the performances of the Africa Centres of Excellence for Development Impact (ACE Impact) project performed by the World Bank. The information was conveyed on Monday, 7<sup>th</sup> November 2022 by Mr Harry Gerard Crimi Jnr in his presentation during the Nigeria country roundtable between the World Bank, the French Development Agency (AFD), and the 17 Nigerian ACEs. With this development, CDA and ACEPHAP will receive

The ACE Impact project is a higher education initiative funded by the World and AFD, which formally took off in 2019 in eleven countries of West and Central Africa. The aim of the project is to establish strong specialized regional centres that will each focus on a single thematic area and provide world-class training, research and outreach focused on addressing the development challenges of Africa. The Centres were competitively selected, and BUK emerged as one of the few Universities with more than one Centre (CDA and ACEPHAP). The initial grant to CDA was five million US dollars, while that of ACEPHAP was six million US dollars.

In the implementation of the ACE Impact project, the World Bank employs a "results-based" funding approach in which funds are released to the Centres based on performance and achievement of key milestones. After taking stock of the performances of all the Centres during the mid-term of the project, the high-performing centres will be given addition funds while poorly performing centres will have their initial allocation reduced.

It could be recalled that in the first phase of the ACE project (2014-2019), CDA got an initial grant of about seven million US Dollars and an additional amount of one million US dollars following its excellent performance at midterm.

The Vice Chancellor, Professor Sagir Adamu Abbas, has congratulated the two Centres on their excellent performance and for positively projecting the image of BUK globally.
