# GANDUJE COMMISSIONS CENTRE FOR ADVANCED OCCUPATIONAL AND ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH RESEARCH

overnor Abdullahi Umar Ganduje of Kano State has commissioned the new BUK's Centre for Advanced Occupational and Environmental Health Research at Aminu Kano Teaching Hospital (AKTH).

The multi-million naira complex was a donation to the University by the Governor.

Dr. Ganduje also promised that Kano State through the Ministry of Health, would discuss with the World Bank and other Development Partners on the need to attract more support to the centre. He hoped that the University and the Hospital would make use of the "Golden Opportunity" to get grants that could be used to develop the local capacities, and make use of new discoveries in developing the area of public health.

In his address, the Vice Chancellor, Professor Sagir Adamu Abbas, who was represented by the Deputy Vice Chancellor (Management Service), Professor Mahmud Umar Sani, observed that the centre was the first of its kind in Nigeria and that it would help in promoting knowledge in the field of general medicine and environmental health in terms of research to improve environmental health and address the challenges of occupational hazards.

He explained that the centre would collaborate with national and international agencies like Centre for Disease Control and Prevention in an advanced area of general medicine and environmental health. He thanked the Governor for his noble intervention for the University and



Speaking shortly before he commissioned the Centre, which was named after him, Governor Ganduje said he believed that BUK has prioritized the conduct of cutting edge research which would impact positively on the society, adding that the Centre would definitely provide opportunity to the University to participate in the global, occupational and environmental health phase through research.

He said he was satisfied having fulfilled the request made to him by the Department of Community Health, saying that the centre would house a new community complex, seminar room, museum, examination offices, public health laboratory and many more offices for academic staff of the

the Department of community medicine and the Hospital at large.

Earlier, the Kano State Commissioner of Health, Dr. Aminu Ibrahim Tsanyawa said the centre would serve as a home for knowledge and provision of constant collaboration from various discipline. He further stated that it would also serve as an inspiration that would provide a platform for professionals, skills and expertise in the face of occupational and environmental health.

Dr. Aminu thanked the Governor for his indispensable role in moving the state and the health sector to greater heights.

She informed the audience that one of the ground breaking achievements recorded by the centre was the presentation of the result of the E-Motive Research on Postpartum Haemorrhage and its publication in the New England Journal of Medicine. She said the research result showed that postpartum haemorrhage among mothers could be reduced by 60 per cent.

She said the research was a collaborative effort with University of Birmingham, World Health Organization (WHO) and other teams from Tanzania, Kenya and South Africa. The result she said was presented at the International Maternal Newborn Health Conference (IMNHC 2023) in Cape Town, South Africa.

In his address, the Vice Chancellor, Professor Sagir Adamu Abbas, represented by the Deputy Vice Chancellor

### Maryam Aliyu Wins ACEPHAP Maiden Pitch Competition ... Carts Home N3.5million

Maryam Nasiru Aliyu, a medical doctor has emerged as the overall winner of the ACEPHAP organized ptiching competition, and won a cash prize of N3.5 million.

The event took place on Tuesday, 23<sup>rd</sup> May, 2023 at the Mahmud Tukur Theatre, Old Campus, BUK. A total of 14 talented healthcare innovators pitch their ideas and at the end four teams emerged winners of the competition.

The ideas that won the competition are: OncoBiometrics: An Al-Powered breast cancer screening tool that uses finger printing dermatoglypics for cancer screening. It was presented by Maryam Nasiru Aliyu, a medical Doctor. She emerged the overall

best and won a cash prize of N3.5million. By that feat, Maryam became ACEPHAPINNOVATOR of the year.

The second prize went to the team that presented on Ecofriendly Reusable Menstrual Pad led by Amina Suleiman Rajah, a nurse. She won N2.5million. The third position was captured by the team that made presentation on Digital Heart by Digital twin technology. It was anchored by Olugbenga Abejirin, an Information and Technology specialist. He won a prize of N2million. KADSMED, a safe medicines disposal project presented by Basira Kankia Lawal, a pharmacist earned the 4<sup>th</sup> position and a cash prize of N1.5million.

Apart from the 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup>, 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> positions, all the remaining 10 contestants took home consolation prizes of N250, 000 cash each making a total of N12million cash distributed as prizes.

Hadiza Galadanci said the essence of the competition was to identify young innovators and entrepreneurs with ideas on how to address the myriads of challenges facing the health sector and empower them to enable them convert their ideas into products that would benefit humanity.

She said part of the reasons why the Centre organized the Healthcare Innovation Week was to build the capacity of health personnel on entrepreneurship and innovation by imparting on them the knowledge of not only doing business but succeeding in the ventures. It also organized Pitch competition among prospective young innovators. Pitching, she said, was to give the contestants a level playing ground to present their different innovative ideas in healthcare and at the end, a team of judges would listen

to them and select the contestants with the best idea and rewards them with cash prizes to enable them to use the cash to convert their ideas into product for the benefit of the society.

In his address earlier, the Chairman of the Local Organizing Committee of the Healthcare Innovation Week, Dr. Ahmad Jameel Ismail had told the audience that the committee gave a level playing ground to all interested to participate in the pitch competition. The Committee invited applications from prospective innovators, saying that a total of 52 candidates applied and that after screening, only 14 scaled through and were eligible to participate in the contest. The pitching competition was the presentation of innovative ideas in healthcare by contestants, with a view to selecting contestants with the best idea and reward them with cash prizes to enable them to convert their ideas into product to benefit humanity.

#### Nigerian Society of Plant Protection holds 48th Annual Conference

The Nigerian Society of Plant Protection (NSPP) held its 48<sup>th</sup> Annual Conference tagged: "Kano-NSPP 2023. It was jointly organized by the Faculties of Agriculture and Life Sciences in collaboration with the Centre for Dryland Agriculture (CDA).

Speaking at the occasion on Monday 15<sup>th</sup> May, 2023, Professor (Engr) Mohammed Khalid Othman of National Agricultural Extension and Research Liaison Services Ahmadu Bello University, Zaria in a keynote address titled: "Plant Health, Crop Improvement and Sustainable Food Security", said plant health and crop improvement are essential strategic tools of achieving food security in Nigeria. He said various techniques and technologies to enhance the yield, quality and nutritional content of crops

Earlier, the Vice Chancellor, Professor Sagir Adamu Abbas, who was represented by the Deputy Vice Chancellor (Academics), Professor Muhammad Sani Gumel, said the theme of the conference 'Plant Health, Crop Improvement and Sustainable Food Security could not have been organized at a better time than now in view of the challenges of food security, escalating food prices and rising cost of food imports to meet the deficiencies.

Nigeria he said was a major global producer of agricultural products before the oil boom, when agriculture had traditionally been the mainstay of Nigerian economy with many assigned roles and still remained the major employer of labour in the nation. With rising unemployment, Professor Abbas said some of the roles ascribed to the agricultural sector in a growing economy like Nigeria



could be of use to human beings, animal and also to improve GDP of the nation.

Professor Khalid said the strategy that could contribute to food security is improving the nutritional content of crops with new crop varieties that have higher nutritional value. He said this could help to address malnutrition and related health issues which are prevalent in Nigeria. He said Biofortication is a crop improvement technique which involves increasing the nutrients content of crops that can help farmers to increase the productivity, crop quality and access to food as well as increasing the income of small holder farmers which might enable them to earn more from their harvest thereby helping to reduce poverty.

include providing adequate food for an increasing population which might constitute major source of employment as well as supplying raw materials to a growing industrial sector. He said it will constitute major source of foreign exchange earnings and provide a market for the product of industrial sector and boost the economic growth of the nation.

In his remark, the Chairman Local Organizing Committee, Professor A.U. Yusuf said the present modes of food production, falls short of addressing the issues of food availability, accessibility and utilization. He said there was need for using scientific and technological strategies in dealing with substandard food in Nigeria.

#### **ACEPHAP, HILWA Collaborate With** Stakeholders to Commemorate this Year's International Women's D

Policy (ACEPHAP), Initiative for Community ten school-age African girls didn't attend school during Development Focus (14C) and High Level Women menstruation or dropped out at puberty due to lack of Advocates (HiLWA) have partnered with other stakeholders to commemorate this year's International Women's Day.

This year's celebration was marked by creating awareness to communities, family and education stakeholders and specifically school leaders and guidance and counseling teachers on menstrual hygiene and the need to establish pad banks in schools across Kano State.

Speaking at the well attended occasion which took place on Tuesday, 16th May, 2023 at SBMC Hall, State Basic Education Board (SUBEB), Audu Bako Secretariat, Kano, the ACEPHAP Director, Professor Hadiza Galadanci, said ACEPHAP supported HiLWA and other partners to celebrate International Women's Day 2023 in order to create awareness on the dangers inherent in lack of menstrual hygiene, which she said was the major cause of reproductive health challenge among adolescent girls. She added that this menstrual poverty in schools in Kano State was seriously affecting participation in school activities and the learning outcomes of girls.

Professor Galadanci added that in order to address the challenge of girls' menstrual hygiene, 'we are supporting the establishment of Pad Banks in 100 schools. I believe that this endeavour will increase access, attendance, retention and participation in learning for adolescent girls in 100 focus junior secondary schools in Kano State.' She also added that it would ensure healthy menstrual hygiene, which could prevent the potential risks of reproductive health, such as gynecological infection and later infertility. 'We are pleased to collaborate with all partners to ensure that we retain our girls in schools and in turn ensure they leave a healthy reproductive health,' she remarked.

In her address, the President of High-Level Women Advocates (HiLWA), Professor Aisha Ismail, of the Department of Political Science, Bayero University, Kano, shed more light on why it was necessary to establish School Pad Banks in a paper titled: 'Why School Pad Banks'. She said reducing the number of out of school children had been a strategic agenda of the Nigerian Government and her partners, including UNICEF. According to her, the focus on girls' education was based on the understanding of the enormous challenges girls faced, as well as the opportunities education created for them, their families, communities and the nation.

Professor Ismail explained that available data in Nigeria showed that girl education, especially retention, was affected by challenges related to the management of menstruation, which occurred at the onset of puberty in girls and the prevalence of school related Gender Based Violence. She said that according to the estimates of the

Africa Centre of Excellence for Population Health and United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), about one in cleanliness, the absence of sanitary pads and separate toilet facilities for female students at school. She said several studies documented that menstruation related problems had affected more than a third of students' class concentration, participation, socializing with friends, testtaking skills and homework task performance.

> The HiLWA President explained that the objective of the school Pad Banks was to increase access, attendance and participation in learning for adolescent girls in the 100 focus junior secondary schools. The pad bank is to be distributed to the focused 100 schools free. She said the dignity packs would be distributed to 100 schools across Kano State, adding that each content pack contained 10



Sanitary Pads, one dozen of Panties, 20 Soaps, 10 Sponges and 10 Sanitizers.

She said a special space would be created in the school where the Bank items would be stored and marked 'School Pad Banks.' The Bank items would consist of: Sanitary Pads, First Aid Box comprising analgesics, etc, Washing Soap, Hand wash, Disposable Pants, Pant Liners, etc. She added that a stock inventory would be opened and maintained with (quantification).

She called on the school leaders to effectively maintain the pad banks while the SBMC and community would all contribute and support its sustainability to ensure uninterrupted attendance, retention and the completion and transition of girls to the next level of education.

Some of the partners that collaborated with HiLWA to organize the event sent in goodwill messages. Among them were the UNICEF representative, AGILE Project and Hajiya Amina Umar from SUBEB among many others.

At the end of the event, the Principals of the 100 benefiting Junior Girls Secondary Schools were presented with the dignitary packs.

The Director, CGS, Dr Suwaiba Said Ahmad in her opening remarks, welcomed all to the epoch making event. According to her, the launching was supposed to take place in March to commemorate the International Women's day, but was not possible because of the general election which took place about the same time.

She said the programme was meant to support Young Women, Leaders and Peace Makers for their future development which would flow down to the society at large. She prayed that the take-home after the deliberation would make positive impacts on the participants as well as people around them.

The Programme Officer, CIPP - Mercy Corps, Mrs. Halima Usman in her overview of the CIPP Mercy Corps, said CIPP was a 5-year peace building programme which was being funded by USAID to prevent violent conflict in the most at risk communities in 6 states of Northwest and North central region.

According to her, CIPP works with community leaders, women, government officials and state level actors to improve their ability to peacefully manage disputes and prevent violent extremist recruitment tactics to strengthen early response mechanism for timely response to violent conflicts.

The lead paper presenter, Dr Habeeba Adamu Kakudi, Head of Department of Computer Science in her presentation titled "Women in ICT: implication for development' disclosed that as at 2015 women represented 17% working in high tech companies.

She said, gender issues facing women in ICT are lack of mentor; lack of female role model; gender bias in work place; unequal growth opportunities among others. She said the only way to mitigate all these issues are to close gender pay-gap using innovative technology; automated blind recruitment and use interactive simulation to evaluate skills.

science degrees and certificates; support women owned technology business; encourage more women to speak at tech event and build a support network.

Dr Suwaiba Said Ahmad in her presentation titled: 'Mentorship program for young women, peace builders and leaders said women and girls need support to reach their full potential,' said mentoring was a process whereby more experienced person come together



to develop less experienced ones.

She said it was also a form of motivation, advice and career development which will enhance professional development. Dr. Ahmad said mentorship was not necessarily about promotion, but could be directly linked to career success. According to her, mentorship enhanced skills in leadership and promote external professional network. She said mentoring helped mentees to reach their full potentials; promote career mobility; provide supportive environment and also challenged one to use talents and share experience.

Mrs. Mariagorretti Aya, Senior Program Officer, Gender and Social inclusion (GESI) in her presentation on Development of mentoring plan, said mentors should give substantial attention to mentees while mentees should analyze solutions proffered. She said in mentoring, goals and objectives should be specific measurable, achievable, realistic so as to ensure that efforts are directly contributing to the achievement in the short and long term. She said setting mentoring goal enabled one to provide purpose and direction for mentoring.
