



## World University Ranking: Again, BUK Emerges Among Top 5 Best Nigerian Varsities

**F**or two consecutive years, Bayero University, Kano has maintained its status as one of the top best five universities in Nigeria, according to the global university ranking conducted by the Times Higher Education (THE) United Kingdom.

In its 2024 World University Ranking (WUR) report released this week by the United Kingdom based Education assessor, Times Higher Education (THE), it ranked BUK as overall best in the country in terms of international outlook with 49 points ahead of other Nigerian universities.

Other indices considered for the ranking include research quality, research environment and industry as well as international outlook.

According to the report the exercise was conducted based on its new WUR methodology, carefully calibrated performance indicators that measure an institution's performance across five areas; teaching, research environment, research quality, industry and international outlook.

About 3,000 institutions across the world submitted data for assessment in which 1,904 universities across 108 countries and regions were ranked while over 700 others

got 'reporter' status of the assessment.

The list of best universities in Nigeria (both private and public) include Covenant University as the overall best in the country, followed by universities of Ibadan and Federal University of Technology, Akure as second and third positions, while Bayero University and University of Lagos complete the top five.

With this ranking, Bayero University remains as top best institution in the entire northern region, south east and the south-south geo-political regions as all the four other universities are from the South-western region.

Further analysis indicates that BUK was rated in the global arena in the group bracket of 1201-1500.

This performance is the manifestation of quality leadership exhibited by the Professor Sagir Adamu Abbas led management which emphasized on productivity and standards.

Reacting to the development, the Vice Chancellor, Professor Sagir Adamu Abbas expressed delight for the university's ability to maintain its status, assuring that the management is committed to improving on its performance with a view to occupying the overall best position.

This year's ranking analysed more than 134 million citations across 16.5 million research publications and included survey responses from 68,402 scholars globally. Overall, 411,789 data points were collected from more than 2,673 institutions that submitted data.

Trusted worldwide by students, teachers, governments and industry experts, the 2024 league table reveals how the global higher education landscape is shifting.

At the University of Oxford tops the ranking for the eighth year in a row, but others in the top five have seen shifts in their ranks. Stanford University moves up to second place, pushing Harvard University down to fourth.

The Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) climbs up two places to third this year. The University of Cambridge slips to fifth place, after being in joint third place last year.

Stanford University leads the teaching pillar, while the universities of Oxford and Cambridge come top for research environment globally. The research quality pillar, which is the newly renamed citation pillar, sees MIT in first place.

The University of Sharjah in the United Arab Emirates scores highest in international outlook, while 28 institutions receive a top score of 100 for the industry pillar.

In a related development, Bayero University was amongst the few institutions that featured in the 2023 Commonwealth Education Report which focuses on quality teaching and research.

The report appreciated the contribution of the institution in the aspect of quality teaching, research and innovation it recognizes BUK as one of the leading tertiary institutions in the country and the Commonwealth nations that impacted positively towards societal growth and development through quality education.

The Commonwealth Education Report 2023 focuses on solutions that can drive widespread change, equipping young people with the necessary skills to thrive in future crises.

The report offers an enlightening perspective on the ongoing educational challenges, featuring contributions from leading experts in the field. Their collective wisdom sheds light on how Commonwealth nations can recover from the pandemic and achieve an inclusive and equitable quality education for all.

The Commonwealth, comprising 56 countries with a population of 2.5 billion, is a global network that collaborates to advance prosperity, democracy and peace. Often referred to as a 'family of nations', it encompasses diverse geographical regions, religions, and cultures.

## Physiotherapy Education in Nigeria Must Embrace Emerging Technologies - Prof. E.B John

For Physiotherapy education in Nigeria to thrive and be at par with its peers around the world, it must embrace the emerging technologies, Professor Emmanuel Babatunde John of York College, University of Pennsylvania, United States of America, has said.

He spoke at the 5<sup>th</sup> Annual Memorial Lecture organized by the NWUGA Physiotherapy Foundation in collaboration with the Department of Physiotherapy, Bayero University, Kano on Tuesday, 26<sup>th</sup> September, 2023 held at Faculty of Dentistry, Lecture Theatre.

According to him, anything that is affecting the Nigerian society also affects its physiotherapy education system, adding that these circumstances and events have not given

us a pause to re-imagine, re-package and re-calibrate our education system.

The guest speaker argued that unlike the Global Positioning System (GPS) that checks its relative positioning of all the satellites with the earth and ground stations at least once a day and make minor corrections, our education system has not kept up with these moving parts. He said it is therefore a time to crank up our Physiotherapy education GPS and it is time to rise and self-correct the positioning error and forge ahead to update and upgrade the education system bringing it up to the 21<sup>st</sup> century.

“I am here to announce that we are ready and willing to rally together and correct our positioning errors in our national GPSes, change courses and start playing catch up with the rest of the developed world in Physiotherapy,” he said.

Speaking on the reforms of clinical practice industry, Professor John said the way our students are trained as clinicians especially looking at the DPT programmes that are evolving, their primary care and physiotherapy diagnostic clinical reasoning skills need to be revolutionized. He added that our clinical education must mirror the changing face of healthcare and medicine, noting that the future includes personalized care through



analysis of genetic composition of the patient and tailor making their rehabilitation plans.

He advised that since the coming of highly sophisticated technologically driven rehabilitation practice will be too expensive for individual business owners to have enough capital to invest, there is the need for collaboration with government and private sector investors to create major rehabilitation centres where most of what he called rehabilitation diagnostic and evaluation centres and then directed to local physiotherapy for intervention and follow up.

Prof John while commending the NWUGA Foundation for immortalizing the late Prof Boniface for inspiring the physiotherapists in Nigeria, challenged colleagues in Nigeria to either repair, overhaul or completely install new GPSes for proper global positioning of Physiotherapy profession so that we are not left behind the rest of the world.

The Vice Chancellor, Professor Sagir Adamu Abbas, who was the special guest of honour at the occasion said it was a worthwhile for Nwuga Foundation Society to organize this

lecture which was titled: *Repositioning and Nigeria's Physiotherapy Education and its Clinical Practice Industry into the 21<sup>st</sup> Century.*

The Vice Chancellor, who was represented by the Deputy Vice Chancellor, Management Services, Professor Mahmoud Umar Sani, said bringing the annual lecture to BUK for the first time showed the confidence the foundation had on BUK and the lecture was apt due to its importance in trying to transform the physiotherapy education in Nigeria.

He said Bayero University has been selected as the best university in Nigeria in terms of international visibility and fourth best overall by the British Times Higher Education, noting that the College of Health Sciences has contributed immensely in this regard. He said the University management would continue to support the college to improve teaching, learning, research and collaboration with medical and health programmes.

## SDG at Half-Time: Hope is Not Lost – Prof. Galadanci Assures

In spite of the minimal successes to meet the SDG 3 targets at half time, hope should be kept alive with an opportunity to win the vital match in the second half abounds.

“I am optimistic that winning in 2030 is possible. We have 146 countries that have met or are on track to meet the SDG target in under five mortality. There are great learnings from countries that other countries can leverage on.”

These are some of the inspiring words contained in the address of Professor Hadiza Galadanci on Thursday 21<sup>st</sup> September, 2023 at the “SDG Half Time” event with the theme: 'Towards Global Health Equity' at the United Nations General Assembly, New York.

Hadiza Galadanci, a Professor of Obstetrics and Gynaecology and Director Africa Centre of Excellence for Population Health and Policy (ACEPHAP) Bayero University, Kano, presented a disturbing picture of the avoidable agony expectant mothers pass through during childbirth. She intermittently drew applause and sometimes tears from the audience who listened to her presentation with enthralled attention.

She released a disturbing statistic which shows that Nigeria contributes 28% of the global maternal death with a daily global maternal death of eight hundred (800). “Ladies and gentlemen, that means 224 maternal deaths occurring every day in Nigeria.” She added that; it is pathetic that 'I still see women pouring out blood like a tap following childbirth. I still see women present with dead babies in their wombs having been in labour for two days. I still see women mourning the death of their babies, incontinent of urine ashamed of their offensiveness and abandoned by

their families. I still see women convulsing having Eclampsia which is purely preventable with access to quality antenatal care. I still see children crying in the pediatric emergency with conditions that have long been eradicated in some countries by immunization,” she remarked.

Professor Galadanci further informed her audience that



currently “we have an epidemic of diphtheria in Kano, Nigeria. “I still see healthcare workers exhausted having to care for patients even though, they are burnt out due to poor or inadequate healthcare providers. I still see healthcare workers struggling with inappropriate and inadequate facilities and commodities to care for the vulnerable women and children. We have continued to see inequalities to achievement of universal healthcare that aimed to have no one left behind in accessing quality healthcare services. There is no doubt that we are losing at halftime. But we now have the opportunity to push to ensure we win this vital match in the second half,” she reassured.

She said “we have seen leaders and policy makers in some countries that have exhibited great leadership and accountability skills towards ensuring adequate investments in healthcare services. We have initiatives such as Align NMH where the maternal and the newborn health communities have come together and collectively are ensuring that the mothers and babies do not only survive but thrive. We have seen researchers that are working very hard to find new treatments and new innovations to address the leading causes of maternal and under-five mortality. We have the E-MOTIVE Trial, demonstrating the use of E-MOTIVE bundle which can reduce postpartum hemorrhage or severe bleeding by 60%. We have the IVON Trial that has demonstrated the use of new treatment for anemia in pregnancy. We have STEPMag trial, trying to access simplified method of treating Eclampsia so that we can improve access to care for women in low- and middle-income countries. We have

seen ACTION trial, accessing the use of steroids to reduce morbidity and mortality of preterm birth and on and on.

Professor Galadanci stated that the solution to winning at the end of the march are obviously with us. She said one; commitment of our leaders; holding them accountable to ensure adequate investment in healthcare; two, collective action, ensuring together we are committed to achieving quality, equity and dignity for women and newborn and children including a universal healthcare access and leaving no one behind. Thirdly, supporting researchers to continue to develop new treatments and innovations and importantly ensuring that these new treatments and innovations reach those that require them; which means every mother and child that requires them.

Ladies and gentlemen, “the second half is about to start, let's decide collectively that the lives of our mothers and children are worth saving,” She remarked.

Nigeria is in dire need of peace to grow and prosper the Director Mambayya House, Aminu Kano Centre for Democratic Research, Professor Habu Muhammad has said.

West zone," he said.

Professor Habu Mohammad spoke at a one-day Zonal workshop organized by the Centre in partnership with the United States Institute of Peace on Wednesday, 27th September, 2023 at Green Desert Hotel Kano. The theme of the workshop was "Building Connectivity among Peace Builders to address the challenges of Banditry and terrorism in Nigeria's North-west Zone".

The Director described the workshop as an avenue where after careful selection from various civil societies from North West zone, Kano, Jigawa, katsina, kaduna, Sokoto, and Kebbi States to come together, discuss and network as peace builders to ensure peace in the society using major navigating areas to horizontally and vertically dissect insecurity which has become very disturbing.

He commended the participants for their commitments towards building peaceful society.

Earlier, Dr. Chris Kwaja, Country Director USIP in a brief remark commended the partnership between Mambayya House and USIP which he termed as cordial. He said peace is practical, possible and process where the discussions will facilitate synergy amongst the actors for building peace and eradicating insecurity in the North West zone of Nigeria.

Setting the stage for discussion by the Community Engagement officer, USIP, Mr. Terfa Hemen, emphasized on the need for synergy among actors for peacebuilders in the North West zone at the same time showcasing the need of networking with a visual case study of a community ridden with insecurity.

Professor Habu Mohammad during the work session presented a paper on "Conflict setting and the nature of peace building in the North West zone". The paper mentioned ten types of conflicts five of which are specific

to the North West: Resource based conflicts, Religious-cum sectarian conflict, Political/conflict violence, kidnapping and rural banditry. With the listed conflicts it has become necessary for the peace builders to come together to form a pact to resolve insecurities.

Also identifying some key nature of peace building strategies in the North West: community peace building approach, transformative peace building, reconstructive and institutional approach, practicing peace building in schools, and interfaith-mediation approach.

He said the civil society organizations should focus on conflict prevention and transformation, comprehensive knowledge of conflict origin, work together with the local

people both inside and beyond parties in conflict.

They are also expected to build a strong connectivity amongst themselves to address the current challenges of insecurity bedeviling the North West in particular and Nigeria in general.

Other paper presenters were Dr. Saidu Abdullahi, Deputy Director Research & Development, Mambayya House, Professor Bello Ibrahim, Deputy Director Training, Professor Moses T. Aluaigba Mambayya House.

Participants from different states discussed the papers in an interactive session identifying the situations peculiar to their societies with short presentations from each state.
