

Professor Abubakar disclosed that Nigeria more than any other time needs all and sundry to develop the habit of sacrifice and brotherhood, explaining that we all have a case to answer before the Almighty Allah on how we live in this world, therefore, the earlier we change our attitude the better for us here and in the hereafter.

Also in his sermon, the Imam of Old Campus Juma'at Mosque, Professor Sani Musa Ayagi, advised that Muslims should exhibit good conduct at all times for a better and peaceful living. "Muslims are known for their sacrifice, unity, good conduct and love of one another and we should be seen to adhere to these twin principles."

According to Professor Ayagi, good conduct leads to understanding and harmonious living amongst the populace which in turn promote unity and brotherhood. He charged Muslims to imbibe the spirit of helping one another. He equally called for all to join hands in the fight against begging, unemployment and war against drugs abuse and alcoholism amongst youth.

UK Based Quality Assurance Agency Evaluates BUK Programmes for International Accreditation



A United Kingdom based Quality Assurance Agency has evaluated Bayero University, Kano programmes for international accreditation.

The Quality Assurance Agency for Higher Education, usually referred to simply as the Quality Assurance Agency or **QAA** is the UK higher education sector's independent expert quality body, with a remit to maintain and enhance the quality of teaching and learning in tertiary education in the UK and beyond. It conducts quality assessment reviews, develops reference points and guidance for providers, and conducts or commissions research on relevant issues.

The QAA experts, Julian Ellis and Dr Yue Song conducted various sessions of question and answer on the university's programmes, teacher-student relationship, accreditation, academic planning and programme review among others.

They had sessions with the university management, staff and students as well as having sessions on the physical infrastructures, laboratory equipment and many others.

Vice Chancellor, Professor Sagir Adamu Abbas while responding to questions from QAA, said Bayero University has grown in leaps and bounds with 15 research centres, 18 faculties, 92 departments, 99 undergradiate programmes, 25 part-time undergraduate programmes and 200 postgraduate programmes. He said the University has a total of 45, 810 students.

The University he said was ranked as the 4th best university in Nigeria by the Times Higher Education, UK and 1,016 globally.

He explained that in whatever the university is doing, it follows the due process and laid down procedure either in programme review, accreditation exercise, staff recruitment and examinations.

The Vice Chancellor told the QAA experts that the University has a number of collaboration and partnership with institutions, corporate bodies and agencies especially in Europe and they are conducting joint research activities together/ He added that Bayero University has students from many countries in West and Central Africa and other regions.

On choosing QAA to evaluate and accredit the University programmes, the Vice Chancellor said international quality review ensures that institutions meet and maintain international standard and the review helps potential students and their families to have certain level of trust on the institution.

He said accreditation leads to accountability and higher levels of quality education and that meeting standards attract new students and more collaborators.

There had been a virtual tour of facilities that include physical infrastructure, laboratory equipment and recreation centres, which the Deputy Vice Chancellor, Academics, Professor Sani Mohammed Gumel made a presentation an responded to questions asked.

Other questions were answered by the Director CDA, Professor Jibrin Mohmmed Jibrin, Director Academic Planning, Professor Haruna Musa. And Deputy Director Strategic Planning and Monitoring, Directorate of Academic Planning and Dr Yusuf Garba.

The accreditation was facilitated by Centre for Dryland Agriculture (CDA) and Africa Centre for Population Health and Policy (ACEPHAP) led by the Directorate of Academic Planning Director CDA, Prof Jibrin M. Jibrin, as part of the mandate of Disbursement Linked Indicators (DLI7) by the World Bank which calls for Africa Centres of Excellence to drive international accreditation in their institutions.

Alleged Examination Misconduct:

BUK Expels 26 Students, Rusticates 13, Exonerates 6

The Senate of Bayero University, Kano has expelled 26 students for their alleged involvement in various examinations misconduct. This formed part of the major decisions adopted at the 405th Meeting of the Senate held on Monday, 19th June, 2023.

Upon submission from the Senate Committee on Examination Misconduct and Leakages, the following 26 candidates were expelled for being involved in examinations misconduct in accordance with Category 20:17 (Ai, iii, iv, v, vi, vii x xii and xiii) General Examinations and Academic Regulations (GEAR) and 3.4.2(Ai - xi) General Regulations Governing Postgraduate Studies (GRGPS) as the case may be," said the statement.

The breakdown of the expelled students indicates that, School of Continuing Education had the largest number with six students followed by the Faculty of Engineering with five candidates. Faculty of Education had four candidates and Faculty of Earth and Environmental Sciences had three candidates while Faculty of Basic Medical Sciences had two candidates respectively.

Equally, Faculties of Agriculture, Allied Health Sciences, Arts and Islamic Studies, Communication, Social and

Management Sciences had one candidate each.

In the same vein, one postgraduate student along with twelve other under graduate candidates were rusticated for two or one semesters accordingly, for being involved in examinations misconduct in accordance with Category 20:17(Bi - Bv) General Examinations and Academic Regulations (GEAR) and 3.4.2(Bi - xi) General Regulations Governing Postgraduate Studies (GRGPS) as the case may be.

The affected rusticated candidates are from the School of Postgraduate Studies, School of Continuing Education, Faculties of Education, Faculties of Arts and Islamic Studies, Communication, Computing, Engineering and Management Sciences.

Also, thirteen other candidates were warned for being involved in examinations misconduct in accordance with Category 20:17(Ci - v) as the case may be. The breakdown showed that two candidates are from the School of Postgraduate Studies, five from the Faculty of Pharmaceutical Sciences, two from Engineering and one each from the Faculties of Allied Health Sciences, Basic Medical Sciences, School of Continuing Education and Faculty of Science.

Accordingly, the Senate had directed their respective 3. EDU/19/SPE/00433 departments to release their results for consideration of 4. EDU/18/BSC/00710 Senate Business Committee (SBC).

In another development, the following were exonerated as case of examination misconduct could not be established against them. Consequently, their respective departments were requested to release their results for consideration of Senate Business Committee (SBC). The exonerated candidates are:

The Directorate of Examinations, Admissions and Records was directed to prepare and release the result of Candidate Shuaibu Usman Jama'a - FAIS/91/24154, his date of graduation to reflect his actual date of senate approval.

The Senate had equally upheld its earlier decision of withdrawal of another six students from the Faculties of Social and Management Science, Law, Science and Allied Health Sciences for lack of merit. Other decisions are that the Senate had declined the appeal in respect of Candidate - SPS/18/MST/00011 - Maryam Muhammad Jibia noting that the appeal did not warrant further action while the Case of Candidate SPS/17/MDS/00112 – Samira Suleiman Dauda was stepped down pending further investigation.
